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in this latest collection of his articles of which seven are written especially for this volume Ian Hodder captures and continues the lively controversy of the 1980s over symbolic and structural approaches to archaeology the book acts as an overview of the developments in the discipline over the last decade yet Hodder's brief is far wider his aim is to break down the division between the intellectual and the dirt archaeologist to demonstrate that in this discipline more than any other theory must be related to practice to save effectively our rapidly diminishing heritage

the study of human activity through the recovery and analysis of material culture is referred to as archaeology it can be considered as both a social science and a branch of the humanities the archaeological records consist of biofacts artifacts architecture and cultural landscapes archaeology can be sub divided into a number of academic sub disciplines such as historical archaeology ethnoarchaeology experimental archaeology and archaeometry the discipline of archaeology includes surveying excavation and the analysis of data that is collected to learn more about the past it is a vast discipline that draws upon various fields including history anthropology geography literary history sociology semiology information sciences paleography paleozoology statistics etc some of the most important methods that are used in archaeology are remote sensing field survey excavation computational and virtual archaeology this book is a compilation of chapters that discuss the most vital concepts in the field of archaeology the topics covered in this extensive book deal with the core aspects of this field this book is a complete source of knowledge on the present status of this discipline

archaeological theory has gone through a great upheaval in the last 50 years from the processual theory which wanted to make archaeology more scientific to post processual theory which understands that interpreting human behavior even of past cultures is a subjective study this subjective approach incorporates a plurality of readings thereby implying that different interpretations are always possible allowing us to modify and change our ideas under the light of new information and or interpretive frameworks in this way interpretations form a continuous flow of transformation and change and thus archaeologists do not uncover a real past but rather construct a historical past or a narrative of the past post processual theory also incorporates a conscious and explicit political interest on the past of the scholar and the subject this includes fields and topics such as gender issues ethnicity class landscapes and consumption this reflects a conscious attempt to also decentralize the discipline from an imperialist point of view to an empowering one method and theory also means being politically aware and engaged to incorporate diverse critical approaches to improve understanding of the past and the present this book focuses on the fundamental theoretical issues found in the discipline and thus both engages and represents the very rich plurality of the post processual approach to archaeology the book is divided into four sections issues in archaeological theory archaeological theory and method in action space and power in material culture and images as material discourse

this book assembles articles that show how to apply scientific evolutionism to the study of variation in the archaeological record it delineates the approach to the past in which artefacts are viewed as parts of human phenotypes and thus are subject to selection in the same manner as any somatic feature

many students view archaeological theory as a subject distinct from field research this division is reinforced by the way theory is taught often in stand alone courses that focus more on logic and reasoning than on the application of ideas to fieldwork divorcing thought from action does not convey how archaeologists go about understanding the past this book bridges the gap between theory and practice by looking in detail at how the authors and their colleagues used theory to interpret what they found while conducting research in northwest honduras this is not a linear narrative rather the book highlights the open ended nature of archaeological investigations in which theories guide research whose findings may challenge these initial interpretations and lead in unexpected directions pursuing those novel investigations requires new theories that are themselves subject to refutation by newly gathered data the central case study is the writers work in honduras the interrelations of fieldwork data theory and interpretation

are also illustrated with two long running archaeological debates the emergence of inequality in southern mesopotamia and inferring the ancient meanings of stonehenge the book is of special interest to undergraduate anthropology archaeology majors and first and second year graduate students along with anyone interested in how archaeologists convert the static materials we find into dynamic histories of long vanished people

in this concise friendly textbook patricia urban and edward schortman teach the basics of archaeological theory making explicit the crucial link between theory and the actual conduct of archaeological research the first half of the text addresses the general nature of theory as well as how it is used in the social sciences and in archaeology in particular to demonstrate the usefulness of theory the authors draw from research at stonehenge mesopotamia and their own long term research project in the naco valley of honduras they show how theory becomes meaningful when it is used by very real individuals to interpret equally real materials these extended narratives exemplify the creative interaction between data and theory that shape our understanding of the past ideal for introductory courses in archaeological theory

this book is an introduction to theory in archaeology but with a difference archaeological situations avoids talking about theory as if it was something you apply but rather as something embedded in archaeological practice from the start rather than see theory as something worked from the outside in this book explores theory from the inside out which means it focuses on specific archaeological practices rather than specific theories it starts from the kinds of situations that students find themselves in and learn about in other archaeology courses avoiding the gap between practice and theory from the very beginning it shows students the theoretical implications of almost everything they engage in as archaeologists from fieldwork recording writing up and making and assessing an argument to exploring the very nature of archaeology and justifying its relevance essentially it adopts a structure which attempts to pre-empt one of the most common complaints of students taking theory courses how is this applicable aimed primarily at undergraduates this book is the ideal way to engage students with archaeological theory
